A. Broadband

Broadband access for individuals and communities tops the list of conference interest topics every year. Broadband means ready computer access to the Internet; it's information travelling at light speed, rather than the slow "tin can and a string" caricature of dial-up. It can be provided in a number of ways, either through direct lines (known as T-1), through telephone high speed fiber optic connections, or via cable television providers. Satellite and cellular based options are also available. It is the heart of any business model and a necessity for modern communications. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 provided federal stimulus funds for several projects in the North Country. Steve Erman, Special assistant for Economic Affairs, APA will do a brief presentation summarizing the status of project planning and funding to date. Fred Engelmann, local entrepreneur in Chester, will present a strategy for connecting the "last mile." A challenge that includes, cables, private 3G networks and other non-wireline alternatives.

B. Community Planning and Organizing

It's one thing to hire a consultant; it's quite another to build a community support team and keep them motivated to achieve long-term planning goals. Building community support, organizing volunteers, developing programs, seeking funding sources... several communities have achieved great successes. Elizabeth Cooper, Community Development Coordinator for the Town of Fine and Jim La Valley with ARISE, a community organizing group formed to bring back downhill skiing to Big Tupper in Tupper Lake, will present their methods and accomplishments in building support for community projects.

C. SEQRA for Decision Making by Planning and Zoning Boards

Join Mark Schachner, attorney with Miller, Mannix, Schachner & Hafner, LLC for a training session on the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) for decision making by Planning and Zoning Boards. Mark has provided his extensive experience and knowledge of SEQRA to many Adirondack Towns in their land use actions and decision-making.

A. Perspectives on the Adirondack Park Economy

In follow-up to the recently released report and data base from the "Adirondack Park Regional Assessment Project," there is growing focus on a range of issues affecting the region's economy and property tax base. This panel discussion will provide a number of perspectives on the Park's economy and the challenges and opportunities for regional economic improvement. Garry Douglas - Plattsburgh-North Country Chamber of Commerce; Kate Fish - Adirondack North Country Association; and others.

B. Hamlets of the Adirondacks 3: The Process for Smart Hamlet Expansion

Roger Trancik, Urban Design Consultant, and Bill Johnston, former Essex County Planning Director, will describe the design elements being incorporated into Phase 3 of the “Hamlets of Adirondacks” project. This study is very timely because many communities in the Adirondack Park have expressed a need for additional areas for residential and commercial growth, particularly in regard to affordable housing. “Hamlets 3” examines three case studies using examples from Adirondack hamlets and villages to inform the design of growth areas by building on existing community centers. This has two important benefits: one, it enables the community to integrate land suitable for development into the fabric of the existing hamlet, thus availing itself of the benefits of “smart,” “green” growth; and, two, it complements the protection of forests, farmlands and other forms of open space through the avoidance of visually unappealing and resource inefficient sprawl and strip development. The study is a DEC-funded Adirondack Community Smart Growth Project sponsored by the Adirondack Community Housing Trust.

C. Challenging Issues: ask the Department of State Local Government Staff

The Department of State Local Government staff are always willing to provide assistance with challenging issues. That is why they want to hear from you about a land use issue that has challenged your town. Take a moment to write down a problem of this type that caused your planning or zoning board some anxiety. B. Smart Growth Projects Featuring Tourism & a Community Cultural Center

Adirondack Community Smart Growth Projects encouraged many communities to showcase their best features. Jim McKenna, President of ROOST will describe the “Destination Planning for Essex County” project that is focused on the Towns of Ticonderoga, Moriah, Schroon Lake, North Elba and Wilmington. In Indian Lake, the community rallied to reopen the town theater as a multi-use cultural center. The center offers central Hamilton County a year-round stage for

film and live performances, and meeting space for government and civil organizations. These projects offer benefits to residents and tourist alike.

C. Making a Good Record: Minutes, Findings, and Decision Documents

Presenters from the Department of State will discuss why board members should strive to make land use records that are of value to enforcement personnel, applicants, municipal attorneys, and current and future boards. They will also discuss, in detail the three components of the record: minutes; findings; and the decision document. Code Enforcement Officers will receive 1 hour of In-Service Credit. Attorneys will receive 1 hour of Continuing Legal Education in the area of Professional Practice.

3:30 – 4:45 PM

A. Community Housing

This will be a three-part discussion focused on successful development of community housing in the Adirondacks. First, Emily Kilburn of the Adirondack Community Housing Trust will provide an update on the progress of this Parkwide initiative. Next, there will be a discussion of the types of analyses that are necessary to attract both developers and project financing for community housing projects. A number of housing market studies in Adirondack communities will be detailed including one currently being conducted in Saranac Lake. Third, Agency staff will describe an “accessory apartment” provision the Town of Westport recently received Agency approval for in its local land use program. The provision allows a separate living space within an existing single family dwelling to be occupied by family members or caregivers in a manner that protects and preserves the neighborhood character and property values.

B. APA, DEC and Citizen Input in the Process of Land Use Planning

Changing the official Adirondack Park Land Use and Development Plan Map requires an APA Map Amendment. Creating a management and use plan for an area of State Land requires an approved Unit Management Plan (UMP). If these terms are new to you or you just want to learn more about the planning process, this is the session to attend. Both planning process include public hearings or other opportunities for citizen input. APA and DEC staff will describe the elements required by APA Statute and State Land Master Plan that need to be considered in the process to implement map amendments and UMPs. Fred Monroe, Town of Chester Supervisor and Local Government Review Board Executive Director, will focus on how citizens can organize to ensure their concerns are addressed when decisions are made that affect lands in their towns.

C. Watershed Planning and DOS Grants

Watershed planning enables communities to make informed decisions in efforts to protect and restore water quality. The Department of State, in partnership with the Department of Environmental Conservation, has prepared a guidebook (with video) to help meet the growing demand for assistance in local watershed planning. The guidebook promotes joint efforts to develop watershed management plans as an effective means to reduce nonpoint source pollution and protect and enhance water resources. It outlines a flexible, step-wise approach to encourage local governments and groups to form networks and strengthen partnerships with agencies and educational institutions. It also highlights local and regional successes in a series of case studies. A concluding discussion regarding Department of State grants currently available should provide ideas for funding opportunities for this and other types of community planning projects.
